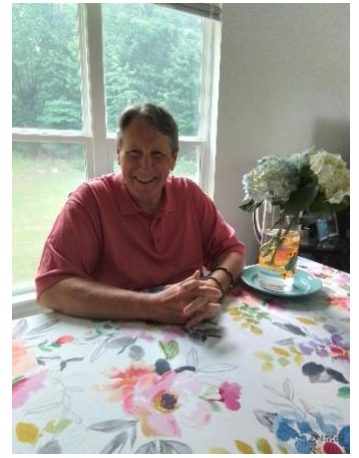
Michael Laver

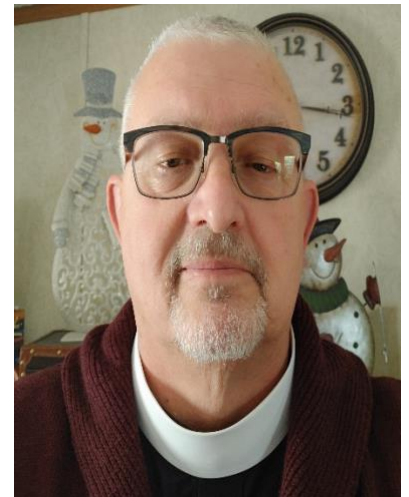
Julie Syracuse
